The Government of Madagascar declared a Health State of Emergency on the 21st March 2020, following the first confirmed cases of coronavirus (COVID-19) in the country. However, in preparation, SEED Madagascar (SEED) teams began implementing emergency preparedness activities in the communities in which we work from the 17th March. Funding has been provided by UNICEF, trusts, and individual donors, ensuring that essential work could begin immediately and reflexively respond in real time.

SEED is implementing community preparedness activities alongside the local government and other providers in three fields:

- 1. Widespread dissemination of clear COVID-19 prevention messages across a range of mediums
- 2. Provision of masks to staff working directly with communities and to those most vulnerable
- 3. Establishment of handwashing stations in remote communities

Widespread communication of preparedness and prevention messages

The 50 posters provided by the Ministry of Communication will be distributed next week to Mahatalaky and other partner communities.

SEED's social media campaign remains ongoing through its Facebook and Twitter channels, with regular posts on preventive measures, symptoms and fact-checking. SEED are publishing informative posts in both English and Malagasy, to target both international and national audiences. Messages are being tailored to each audience as appropriate. SEED is continuing progress to produce short animated videos that reinforce prevention messages. The next video, on the topic of mask-wearing is expected to be published next week.

SEED continues to work in partnership with local authorities, including the 'Centre de Commandement Operationnel' (CCO) to meet the emerging needs of communities as they face the threat of COVID-19.

Increasing supply of critical resources

SEED's partner organisation, Stitch Ste Luce, is continuing their production of 600 masks. These are anticipated to be completed by the 24th April and distributed to community members by the 1st May.

SEED has also distributed 200 masks to elderly people needing to collect their pensions within Fort Dauphin, and an additional 40 masks have been sent to the Ministry of Population.

Establishment of handwashing stations in remote communities

In Sainte Luce, two handwashing stations have now been established, at the Public Health Centre and Chef Fokontany (Village Head) Office. In addition, SEED are building a third handwashing station at the market in Sainte Luce. All three stations will be managed through the Chef Fokontany and are supplied with soap.

In Mahatalaky, four handwashing stations are now in place. An additional seven stations will be built in the next week, bringing the total to 11. This will ensure handwashing stations are available at all key community locations, including the Public Health Centre, the Mayor's Office, the Chef Fokontany, the gendarmie and the market. The handwashing stations in Mahatalaky stations will be managed through the Public Health Centre.

The coming months

SEED's team of staff and volunteers are committed to supporting vulnerable community members throughout the COVID-19 crisis. Alongside emergency preparation and response measures, SEED will continue essential activities for our existing programmes where safe and feasible for staff and communities to do so, while following global and national recommendations and restrictions to protect against COVID-19. SEED will act to continuously protect the community of Fort Dauphin, and the people throughout Madagascar that we work with and employ.

SEED will continue to seek additional funding to continue and expand both its activities and reach as the scale of the impact on the people of Madagascar becomes clear.
