
2 - Challenge yourself



The organisation has implemented a wide range of sustainable development and conservation projects across the Anosy region, working with local communities to support livelihoods and build environmental resilience. Our projects cover 5 key areas: Education Infrastructure, Community Health, Environmental Conservation, Rural Livelihoods and WASH (water sanitation and hygiene).

Madagascar Facts

The population of Madagascar is over 30.3 million (World Bank, 2023)

39.7% of Madagascar's population is undernourished (Global Hunger Index, 2024)



Madagascar is the only natural home of lemurs and the Rosy periwinkle, an effective cure for childhood leukaemia

Madagascar is home to more rchids than the entire African continent. The island has nearly 1,000 orchid species.

1 in 20 children die before the age of 5 as a result of what are largely preventable diseases, such as cholera (ReliefWeb, 2021)

Approximately 95% of Madagascar's reptiles, 89% of its plant life, and 92% of its mammals are endemic (WWF) but the island has suffered nearly 90% deforestation (estimated by Conservation International)

Madagascar is twice the size of Britain, and the fourth largest island in the world.



SEED Madagascar works in the Anosy Region, where 29.2% of households are managed by women (INSTAT, 2020) and 70% of the region lacks access to safe drinking water (UNICEF, 2021). 50% of school aged children in the region have never been to school

80.7% of Madagascar's inhabitants live below the poverty line of \$2.15 per day (World Food Programme 2023)

Tell everyone about SEED Madagascar!

When you're setting up your fundraising page, it's important to give everyone information about what the charity does, why you're raising money, and how the funds will support their work. These overviews of our projects should help you to tell everyone how important SEED's work is to you...



Schools

In the Anosy region of Madagascar, many children do not have access to education. Only around 50% of children have been to primary school. Through our education projects, SEED Madagascar aims to tackle this by building new schools, repairing existing buildings, providing furniture and facilities to schools in need, and supporting teachers to teach.



Community Health

Many people in Madagascar do not have access to sufficient medical care or basic health education. There are high levels of child malnutrition and mortality, particularly in remote areas. SEED works to increase knowledge of sexual, reproductive, maternal and child health amongst women through project Votsira. SEED also seeks to improve nutrition levels in young children though project Miatrika.



WASH

Madagascar ranks third lowest in the world in the use of unimproved water sources (such as unprotected wells, springs, and surface water) and basic sanitation. Our CSB Strengthening project aims to improve the health status of communities by repairing existing, and constructing new, latrines, facilitating the delivery of a Ministry of Health WASH curriculum to healthcare workers, and adding solar-power to community health centres.

Environmental Conservation!



Our environmental projects work to protect threatened areas and species in the Anosy region of Southeast Madagascar - before they are lost forever. Our team of conservationists work alongside passionate volunteers to conduct vital research to help protect a variety of endangered species. We always involve and work with local communities as these are the people who know the most about the local environment and conservation priorities.

The key projects are...

Ala

The Ala Programme focuses on restoring habitat connectivity between the forests where we work. By creating and supporting forest corridors, we help wildlife move more freely and safely between habitats. This work is done hand-in-hand with local communities, who play a vital role in planting trees and nurturing the growth.

Palms

Project Palms works to protect six endangered palm species found in the Sainte Luce littoral forest. We've gathered local knowledge through community surveys, focus groups, and interviews with experts. In 2024, SEED planted over 1,000 endangered palm seedlings.

Our approach respects traditional uses and aligns with community priorities for palm protection.

SCRP

Having been reduced by over 90%, the southern littoral forests in Sainte Luce are one of only three significant areas of this forest type remaining. As the forest has both a high level of biodiversity, and a community heavily reliant on the resources the forest supplies, we work to combine scientific research with community conservation to build knowledge about this.

Our SEED volunteers go on daily surveys, one to three times a day, to look for herpetofauna (chameleons, frogs, geckos and snakes), bats, and 4 species of lemur endemic to Madagascar. The data collected will help us to understand the importance of the littoral forest and surrounding habitats, to track the population trends of key species and help to shape our conservation efforts in the future.



So where does your donation go?...

We ask all conservation volunteers for a minimum donation. But those who fundraise have the chance to go above and beyond!





All proceeds go directly to SEED's projects, with a small fraction helping to support the infrastructure of the volunteer programme such as food and transport.

It is **important to highlight** to everyone supporting you that you are **not raising funds for personal expenses**.

You are covering all your personal costs such as flights and visas and you are raising money to support SEED's projects in the field.

Our Top 6 Tips for Fundraising



- **1. Plan:** If you are organising an event you will need to plan ahead. Consider what other events are happening at the time, take advantage of social events and holidays.
- 2. Fundraising page: Always set up a fundraising page, even if you are holding an in person event. There will be people who cannot attend or who would like to donate more after the event. We recommend "Enthuse", so that your family and friends can keep track of donations and help you to reach your target. It is the easiest way for supporters to donate to your fundrasier.
- **3. Promote:** Tell everyone you know. Speak to people, message friends, set up a Facebook event and use Instagram stories. Think about your target audience and how best to engage them.
- 4. Network: Think about who you know and how they can help you. Spend time talking to people about your fundraising and SEED. Not only will they be likely to donate, but they will also spread the word to their network. Some people may share their time or resources to help you too. Generally, people are more willing to get involved than you think, you may be surprised where help comes from!
- **5. Support:** Fundraising can be challenging and daunting at times, but we are here to help. Get in touch for advice and resources (see the glossary at the end of this guide).
- **6. Thank people:** most online platforms allow you to write a personal thank you message to those who donate.

A couple of last things...

- **Keep it ethical** SEED is proud of our work and vision and we want you to help us spread the word of the work we are doing. With this in mind, make sure that you choose an ethical and appropriate fundraising activity to help us both raise awareness and give us your vital support.
- **Keep it legal** if you're organising an event, it is your responsibility to make sure it is legal and safe. Remember to get permission, do any necessary risk assessments. You may also need to get permits to fundraise publicly, an alcohol or entertainment licence and insurance.
- **Keep it factual** use the pages in this document and SEED's website to make sure that the information you are sharing about SEED and Madagascar are correct.
